Overview

Originally brought from Europe the celebration of the Day of the Dead was adopted by the Mexicans and fused with the prehispanic customs and attitudes, resulting in a uniquely Mexican custom especially prevalent in Oaxaca today. Today the Day of the Dead reflect the Mexican belief in the duality of life and death. While they mourn and miss their dead loved ones, they also believe that death is just an extension of life. It's part of a natural progression, not an end. The dead continue to exist and return annually to visit their loved ones. Many of the customs, such as home altars and cemetery vigils, are to help them find their way and to welcome them home.

The principal celebrations take place beginning October 31 and end on November 2. Oaxaca is one of the few places in the world that preserves these customs and traditions, which is why it has become a favorite destination for El Dia de Los Muertos. Oaxaca's historic district has been designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

The Day of the Dead San Miguel in Oaxaca city all day and evening. This festival is celebrated in each of the village's neighborhood by young people who dress up as doctors, widowers, priests, grandfathers and grandmothers, devils, witches and skeletons. They make their way from the cemetery dancing and playing wood-wind instruments and collecting offerings of chocolate, bread and fruits for the dead from the houses they pass. At a pre-determined spot, the revelers break stride and launch into a brief street-theatre kind of presentation in which Life makes fun of Death. Shoot lasts all night - or until you get tired!

Accommodation

Our Masterclasses are purely about photography. Travel

Your final destination is the city of Oaxaca in Mexico. International flights into Mexico fly into Mexico City International Airport (also called Benito Juárez International Airport). Upon arriving in Mexico City, the usual route is to take a connecting flight to Oaxaca. The following airlines fly several times a day into Oaxaca:

Companions

Photography is a passion that touches millions of people, but that doesn't always mean that it is shared throughout your family! A great many of our participants choose to travel with their husbands, wives or partners, and we make every effort to make them just as welcome as everybody else. Should you wish to attend with your partner we would welcome them to join us in the evenings during our organised dinners. Alternatively you are both free to spend your evenings away from the group if you wish to make your own plans. As you will make your own accommodation plans, we would simply ask that you inform us if a partner would be attending.

The Photography

Photography

The Day of the Dead is celebrated with passion and life. There are three days of rituals that take place in the cemeteries, the houses and streets. In the cemeteries people come to visit the graves of their departed loved ones bearing flowers, candles, food and playing music; thus the cemetery is converted into a center of pilgrimage. In the houses, altars are constructed and adorned with fruit, bread, chocolate and other offerings in honor of the dead. It is in the streets that "the comparsas" are celebrated. Here, young people dress up in costumes and dance through the streets accompanied by the music provided by live bands.



People buy their pots, flowers and food during the week, to adorn the altars in their homes before moving the flowers and food to the graves of their dead loved ones on Oct 31, Nov 1 and 2. Bands and mariachis serenade the graves of the newly dead and though there is grief, there is also celebration, as one visits with their dead loved ones. During the week, on the plaza in front of the cathedral and in the pedestrian malls, artists and students mold giant three-dimensional sand paintings depicting, skeletons, ghosts and other aspects of death. The City of Oaxaca also arranges events at the San Miguel Cemetery, such as exhibition/competition of altars, music, etc.

Teaching

Teaching is done through a combination of daily image review sessions, in the field demonstrations, and hands-on practice. As much of the shooting is to be done amongst towns and crowds, we set meeting points, where your instructor will be so that during the day's shooting, you can always find somebody to assist you and answer any questions. In the evening we all head out for dinner together and have a good chat about the day's events. Image review sessions are conducted using a laptop.

Is this for me?

This course in Mexico is what we call a Masterclass. This means that it is designed for people who are relatively comfortable with the operation of their cameras.

In order for you to get the most out of this Masterclass, we suggest that all participants have the following:

Use an SLR camera with interchangeable lenses

Comfortable with operating a camera's exposure manually

This Masterclass can be a truly inspirational experience, giving you incredible photographic opportunities. The itinerary is all about shooting, the celebrations and getting close to the emotion and people. There will not be tours to major tourist sites, but instead our time will be spent nurturing close relationships with the locals.

Our passion is photography, and we welcome all of you that share this love. One of the great benefits of learning in a group, is the knowledge you also gain from those around you. New ideas, shared critiques and a good sense of camaraderie are ingredients we actively try to encourage in all of our trips.
